Dynamic changes continue to occur in Central federal order milk marketings as dairy producers, cooperatives and processors seek opportunities to pool milk more prudently under the newly consolidated federal orders. During recent issues, this bulletin provided different views or snapshots of producer milk marketings on the order in an effort to depict these evolving monthly changes and other information to interested persons and businesses. This issue examines three different views of milk marketing changes.





The graphics on this page illustrate the percentage and the pounds of producer milk pooled on the Central order from selected states. The volume and proportion of producer milk from Minnesota and Wisconsin have generally increased since the inception of the Central order. These graphs highlight this trend in comparison to general decreases noted in the other selected states.

The map graphic on page two illustrates the September 2000 milkshed for the order with the volume of milk by county. A table providing a distribution of farms by size of milk marketings is included. One area of interest is the category of "large or mega-farms" which market more than one million pounds of milk per month. The map and table on page three provide data on these farms.

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
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
This map illustrates the county location and density of milk marketings on the Central federal milk order during September 2000 when dairy producers marketed milk from 639 counties and 16

There were 122 producers who marketed more than one million pounds of milk on the Central federal order during September 2000. These producers accounted for only one percent of the total number of producers but marketed 19 percent of the milk on the market.
